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**The Raider Reopen**

July 16, 2020

**What will the building look like?**

1. Hand-sanitizing stations in each classroom as well as in the hallways at the top and bottom of each stairway
2. All restroom doors from the hallway will be propped open to prevent having to touch the door. Our restrooms are designed so when an individual walks in they take a 90 degree turn to access the stall or urinal.
3. Air dryers have been disconnected and replaced with paper dispensers.
4. Water fountains will be shut off except for bottle-filling stations.
5. The hallways will have floor markings 6-feet apart to assist with social distancing.
6. All students will have a desk shield on their desk (covers the width and depth and 22 inches high. The students will be in 3-person pods. The separation of students within the pod is 3 feet diagonal separated by Plexiglas, and the pods are spaced 4.5 – 6 feet apart.
7. Common areas (bathrooms, stairway, etc.) will be sanitized minimum twice a day.
8. Classrooms will be sanitized regularly.
9. There will be an isolation room (separate from the nurse's office) for students who are ill. The students will be socially distanced while waiting for a parent to pick them up.

**What will the school day look like?**

1. All students must wear a mask, shield, or scarf when they enter the building, leave the building, and go to common areas (bathroom, hallway, office, etc.)
  - a. Students will be given a breakable lanyard to keep their mask on.
  - b. We have not set a dress code for the masks yet. That will take place during our handbook meeting at the end of the month. If you plan on ordering masks, solid colors will definitely be okay. We will give further direction on what else is considered acceptable by August 7<sup>th</sup>.
2. Temperatures will be taken upon arrival
  - a. Students with a temp under 100.0 will proceed to class.
  - b. Students with a temp at or over 100.0 will go to the isolation room to be checked and possibly sent home.
3. Only students and staff will be allowed in the building. No parents or volunteers will be allowed in the building unless there is an emergency.
4. Morning Extended Day will still be offered. Students will be allowed in their classroom at 7:15 (previously 7:30).
5. Students will remain in their classroom all day, **teachers will rotate**.
6. Teachers will wear a face covering all day.
7. Students in grades K-2 will be allowed to take their mask off when they are in their seat with a desk shield. Students in grades 3-8 will have their mask on a majority of the day. Teachers can designate a time for students to take their mask off when they feel it is safe and appropriate to do so. Examples when masks can be removed with the teacher's permission include: eating lunch, taking a test, or doing silent seatwork.
8. Since students will not be leaving their classroom, all books and supplies will be in their desk. Lockers will only be used to house coats, backpacks, and lunches.

9. Lunch will be in the classroom. We plan on utilizing hot lunch to be delivered to the classrooms. All hot lunches will be delivered in containers or boxes.
10. Each class will have a morning and an afternoon recess to go outside. (10 minutes in morning, 20 minutes in the afternoon). While at recess, students will be in a confined space with only the students in their homeroom.
  - a. Per the health department, recess equipment is allowed and will be sanitized after every recess period.
11. We plan on utilizing library by having students order a book online and Mrs. O'Neal will deliver the book. We are still researching this software.
12. Mass will still take place on Wednesdays at 1:30. One grade will participate in Mass and the others will watch it live in the classroom. Those students who attend Mass will sit 6-feet apart.
13. Birthday treats will not be allowed this school year.
14. The dismissal time for school will begin earlier to prevent hallway congestion. The order of dismissal will also change. Once the dismissal procedure is finalized and approved by the health department we will notify all families.
15. We are waiting for more directives on afternoon Extended Day. After talking with the health department, we are confident that we have a safe plan in place to ensure social distancing. We are waiting for further guidance before we share exactly how Extended Day will operate.

### **When will children be required to stay home?**

1. Under the guidance of the health department, should a student or staff member test positive for COVID-19, he/she is to stay home 10 days from when they started experiencing symptoms, AND must be 3 days symptom-free.
2. Per the health department, if a child lives with a family member (or is exposed to someone) who tests positive for COVID-19, he or she is required to quarantine for 14 days and may return as long as he/she did not experience symptoms in the 14-day period.
  - a. A person is considered exposed if he/she was within 6 feet of someone who tested positive for COVID-19 for fifteen consecutive minutes in the past two days.
3. If a student or staff member tests positive, families will be informed that a student of that class tested positive. The classroom will have a thorough cleaning done.
  - a. Per the health department, students who were exposed to this child, based on the definition of exposure and to the discretion of the health department will be told to quarantine as well. This includes but is not limited to, transportation to and from school as well as athletics.
4. We have been advised that families should consult with their children's physician should they experience any of the symptoms set forth by the CDC: <https://bit.ly/CDCCovidSymptoms>
  - a. Per the health department, should a student or staff member experience any of the symptoms set forth by the CDC, they may be required to quarantine should the physician feel the symptom could be COVID-19 related.

### **Distance- Learning:**

1. It is important to us that no child or family feels pressured or unsafe coming to Christ the King School. With that said, there will be a distance-learning option available. We hope to have such plans finalized soon.
    - a. We ask that the families that prefer to begin the year distance-learning please notify Mr. Urbanski as soon as possible.
    - b. Should a child or family member become diagnosed with COVID-19, this online learning option is intended to be a seamless transition going from classroom learning to online, as well as returning to the classroom when allowed to do so.
    - c. This distance-learning option will also be what is utilized should another stay-at-home order take place.
  2. We currently have orders in place to receive more Chromebooks. As you can imagine, there is a very large demand for technology, and the vendors are having a difficult time keeping up with demands. It is unlikely that we will have enough devices for everyone by the beginning of the school year.
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
